2019 Historic Commission Activities

The Historical Commission oversees all properties listed on the Pennsbury Historic Resources Inventory in order to help retain the unique characteristics of our community. The list of properties is reviewed and updated periodically as recommended by Chester County and the Pennsylvania Historic and Museum Commission.

During the past year Commission members worked on an Historic Resources update, checking the current status of the 211 properties listed in the 2009 Survey. Final work for additions to the inventory will be completed in the new year.

The Commission participated in the review of subdivision plans for two properties which include historic resources. One is a brick federal residence built by Stephen Webb, son of William Webb, original owner of the stone farmhouse now part of the Longwood Gardens Meadow Walk. The second subdivision includes a stone home built in the 1950's to replace an older house on a farmstead dating to the early 1800's. In fact, a small stone tenant house

and restored barn are the oldest structures on the property.

This year, four historic resource property owners were sent letters from the Township regarding demolition by neglect at the request of the Historical Commission. All township land owners are responsible for property maintenance. Historic resources are specially protected from demolition by neglect in the 2012 Zoning Ordinance.

The Supervisors approved Pennsbury participation by the Historical Commission in a Brandywine Battlefield descriptive marker project with funds donated by the Pennsylvania Society of Sons of the American Revolution and its Color Guard. Commission members recommended the Barns Brinton House on Route 1 as Pennsbury's marker placement location. Part

of the Brinton Farm in the late 1700's, the house was in the path of the Hessian troop advance across the Brandywine. The markers will be part of a history application being developed for portable devices by the Battlefield Task Force to enable personal tours.

Designs for the concrete Twin Bridges' replacement on Creek Road were considered this year with input from the Pennsbury and Chadds Ford Supervisors, the Brandywine Conservancy, a local residents' group named the "Friends of the Brandywine," and the Pennsbury Historical Commission, among others. The existing bridge, built in the 1920's is still called Twin Bridges by local residents, although it is officially known as the Rocky Hill Road Bridge in the 2009 Pennsbury Historic Survey. Choice alternatives were submitted this fall, but a final decision and construction date have not been announced by Penn DOT.

A new National Register Historic District, called the

"Twin Bridges," was recognized at the end of 2018 by the National Park Service. The news is included this year since much of the land in the district is located in Pennsbury Township. Recognition will conserve natural and historic resources on the banks of the Brandywine near the existing Twin Bridges, which will soon be replaced. The Brandywine Conservancy sponsored the research and application in commemoration of its fiftieth anniversary.

Historical Commission meetings are held the first or second Thursday of the month and are open to the public. Please check with the Township Manager for the exact date and time.




Pierce House

♦2020 BUDGET

The Board of Supervisors passed a balanced budget for 2020 at their public meeting on Wednesday, December 11, 2019. The property tax stays at 1.49 mills and the earned income tax at 0.312%.

The budget is posted on the website at *www.pennsbury.pa.us*.

\$2020 TAX BILLS

Chester County tax bills will be mailed in January. The Township tax bill will be sent out by March 2.

Please be aware there is an Earned Income Tax of 0.312% in Pennsbury Township which is collected by Keystone Collections. It is your responsibility to make sure this tax is paid by April 15, 2020 if this tax has not been deducted. If you have questions, contact Keystone Collections at 888-328-0565.

School tax bills are sent out by the school district July 1 of each year.

♦ HALT BEFORE YOU SALT

Salt goes a longer way if applied before the snowfall, saving you money.

It prevents ice from bonding to the pavement, making shoveling easier.

Less salt means less chance of washing into streams and depleting nearby soil of beneficial bacteria and nutrients and inhibits plant growth.

Winter Road Reminders

- •DO NOT PARK ON THE STREET DURING A WEATHER EVENT. If our drivers do not think they can salt, cinder or plow a street or cul-de-sac safely, they will SKIP it or plow it last.
- •MAIN SUBDIVISIONS WILL BE PLOWED FIRST. Less populated areas next. The Township plows ONLY municipal roads — not state highways.
- •SECURE YOUR MAILBOX. The Township is NOT responsible for damage caused by snow or ice that is thrown from the snowplow blade. Standard mailboxes and posts are replaced by the Township ONLY if either or both are actually struck by the plow and if these are installed to the specification of the US Postal Service. The Township neither replaces or reimburses residents for custom mailboxes or ornate posts. If you believe a properly installed mailbox or post was struck by a Township vehicle, contact Road Master, Dave Allen at 610-388-9180.
- •DO NOT PUSH SNOW INTO THE STREET. Wait until the roadway is cleared before shoveling your driveway. Shoveling snow into the road creates a safety hazard and could cause an accident.
- PREPARE YOUR VEHICLE for winter driving.
- •DON'T DRIVE if you are too nervous about driving on snow and ice.

MEDICARE ADVANTAGE OPEN ENROLLMENT PERIOD

The Medicare Annual Open Enrollment Period is over, but starting in 2019 a new open enrollment period for Medicare Advantage plans was established for the period January 1 through March 31, called the Medicare Advantage Open Enrollment Period. During this period, you can make one plan change each year if you are enrolled in a Medicare Advantage Plan.

Before you decide to drop your Medicare Advantage Plan, you need to think about ways to protect yourself against costs associated with Original Medicare, such as deductibles, coinsurances, and copayments. Any changes made January 1 through March 31 will go into effect the first day of the following month.

PLANNING COMMISSION UPDATE

The following is an update of the Planning Commission's (PC) activities since the last edition of the *Pennsbury Township News*.

The PC continued to work on the draft of a Special Events Ordinance and related permit criteria as previously reported, and returned our input to the Board of Supervisors and Solicitor, Tom Oeste.

We reviewed an application for a two lot subdivision (lot line change) from Mrs. Emily Smith for property located on Fair Hill Drive. No action was taken at this meeting and the application was later withdrawn.


A Conditional Use Application by Mr. and Mrs. Jetpoul for the installation of roof-mounted solar panels at their property at 11/2 Constitution Drive was reviewed and discussed. We voted to recommend that the Supervisors support the application subject to a written notification to neighbors, the lack of objections from those neighbors and the performance of a glare study.

A zoning variance application to the Zoning Hearing Board submitted by Jennifer Linton for their lot located at 604 Mill Pond Lane, Kennett Square, PA was reviewed. The applicants are seeking zoning relief for the development of their lot in order to build a home. We recommended that the Supervisors take a neutral position on this application.

All residents are welcome to attend Planning Commission meetings on the second and fourth Tuesdays of the month at 5:30 at the Township Building;
