## The John Hope House 1790-1802

The final stretch of Pennsbury Township’s John Hope House Restoration Project is underway. The historic stone house next to the Township building, once engulfed in late 19th and 20th century architectural additions and covered in stucco is being transformed into an historic Pennsbury landmark.

Fortunately, except for a few modifications to doors and windows, all four exterior stone walls of the original 1790-1802 house were intact under the alterations. The additions have been removed, and the windows and doors are being restored to their original sizes and locations. The stucco has been removed from three façades, and the stone is being cleaned and repointed. There is a new cedar shingle roof. A Preservation Garden will preserve the footprint foundations of the demolished late 19th century addition. The east façade will remain stucco.

Historic interior finishes and fireplaces were gutted long before the Township acquired the building. However, significantly intact and beautifully preserved, are the original mortise and tenon rafters and ties in the attic, and in the basement the original brick corbelling and arch supports for the fireplaces.

Structural repairs have been made and while the building is now structurally sound, it is not structurally safe or up to code for occupancy.

The Hope House will become a landmark due to its prominent location next to the Township building and in direct alignment with the distinguished restored historic buildings along Route 1 in the Brandywine Battlefield National Historic Landmark, including Washington’s Headquarters (Benjamin Ring House,) Lafayette’s Quarters (Gideon Gilpin House,) the Chadds Ford Inn, Barns Brinton House, the Pennsbury Inn, the Daniel Pierce House and the Old Kennett Meetinghouse. •



<sup>1</sup> The John Hope House sits on land purchased by John Hope in 1702 but was not built in his lifetime. The manor house he built for himself in c.1702 is the Daniel Pierce House on Hickory Hill Rd and Rt 1.



## Township Taxes

Your township property tax bill was mailed by March 1, 2025. The County tax bill is mailed in January and the School Tax bill (the largest of the three) was mailed by the school district July 1st. If you do not receive any of these bills, it is your responsibility to follow up and get a copy. **There is also an Earned Income Tax in Pennsbury Township (0.312%) and it is collected by Keystone Collections.** Keystone collects this tax for all municipalities in Chester County that have the EIT tax. This is NOT a collection agency – they are the tax collector and can be reached at 866-539-1100.

## Planning Commission Update


*The following is an update of the Planning Commission’s (PC) primary meeting topics and activities since the last edition of the Pennsbury Township News.*

- Zoning Hearing Board Applications were reviewed for the following properties:
  - » 19 Raintree (Canlan Builders). The PC recommended that the BOS support the application subject to Storm Water Management Conditions set forth by the Township Engineer.
  - » 11 Twin Turns (Mr. Skidd). An application was filed for deck replacement and additional structures on the property.
  - » 411 Old Baltimore Pike. C.F. Investment Group (Mr. Steger). An inquiry was made by Mr. Steger as to whether he needed Township approval for leasing a portion of the building to an outside party.
  - » 455 Old Baltimore Pike (Multum in Parvo, LLC). The PC voted to recommend that the Board of Supervisors support this request subject to securing PennDOT’s review and ruling on the setback requirements from Route 1.
  - » 102 Cossart Rd (Josem & Adler). Mr. William Josem presented an application for a variance to allow a stand-alone garage to be built. The PC voted to recommend that the BOS approve the application.
  - » 3 Baltimore Pike (Chadds Ford Elementary School). An application for a special exception was filed to build an outdoor classroom at Chadds Ford Elementary School. The outdoor classroom will provide numerous features including pavilion, instructional wall, and expanded hard surface for activities. The structure will be available for use year-round. The PC voted to recommend that the BOS approve the application.
- The PC continued working with the Brandywine Conservancy regarding potential changes to the zoning ordinances. The PC recommended that the Board of Supervisors support the adoption of the revised and new ordinance language.
- Alan Matas resigned his position on the PC. We wish to thank Alan for his service and contributions. Joe Lewis joined the PC in July. Welcome Joe, we look forward to working with you.

All township residents are welcome to attend Planning Commission meetings which are scheduled for the second Wednesday of the month at 5:30 PM in the Township Building. •


## Fall Branch Pick-Up Week November 17 to November 21

- Brush and limbs must be properly prepared or they will not be collected.
- Brush and limbs must be from your Pennsbury Township property.
- Brush and limbs must be put out before start date as only one pass will be made through each neighborhood.
- NO roots, stumps and limbs with wire and/or nails.
- All brush and limbs must be in the right of way.
- Fresh cut (green) limbs, 2" in diameter and larger, should be left full length,

placed along roadside with large ends closest to road.

- Dry, dead brush and tree limbs must be tied in bundles no greater than 3' long and 12" in diameter.
- A sample bundle is on display at the Township Building along with free bailing twine and instructions.
- Limit of 8 bundles of brush and/or tree limbs and 10 fresh cut (green) branches per property.

Christmas Trees can also be dropped off starting December 26 to January 31.



## Leaf Pick-Up October 20 to November 30, 2025

Bagged leaves can be dropped off at the township building in the designated space starting October 20 to November 30.

Large item disposal for Pennsbury Township residents ONLY, proof of residency may be required. The dumpster will be located near the maintenance garage and will be manned by Township personnel.

## Septic Tank Inspections

Septic Tanks need to be inspected and pumped every three years and confirmation sent to the Codes Division at Pennsbury Township, email: [Codes@pennsbury.pa.us](mailto:Codes@pennsbury.pa.us). Your hauler should have the forms. If not, download the Sewage Inspection Pumping Confirmation form at [pennsbury.pa.us/health-safety](http://pennsbury.pa.us/health-safety). It is the responsibility of the lot owner to make sure the reporting has been done.



## Kennett Regional Fire Department: Pennsbury Township Activity

It has been a busy year for the local fire and EMS departments. Together, the Longwood Fire Company, Kennett Fire Company, and Po-Mar-Lin Fire Company compose the Kennett Regional Fire Department. The regionalization of fire departments has helped improve service delivery by acting as one department, and it has allowed the region to offer more in-house training opportunities, bulk purchases of turnout gear, and collaborative approaches to fundraising.

August was a busy month in Pennsbury Township, with two major motor vehicle accidents both with reported entrapment and one call for a rescue involving an individual who was trapped in an excavator when a structure collapsed on top of the unit. All patients were rescued and taken to local hospitals.

Make sure the heater has an automatic shut-off, so if it tips over, it shuts off.

Make sure your stoves and space heaters are at least 3 feet from anything that can burn (including furniture).




## #988 Suicide and Crisis Lifeline



Chester County has joined communities across the nation, to introduce “988” as the direct phone connection support for anyone experiencing mental health-related distress.

People who call, text, or chat with 988 will be directly connected to the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline. The existing Lifeline phone number (1-800-273-8255) will remain available. Callers can also connect with the Veterans Crisis Line or assistance in Spanish. Lifeline services are available 24 hours a day, seven days a week at no cost to the caller. Trained crisis response professionals can support individuals considering suicide, self-harm, or any behavioral or mental health need for themselves or people looking for help for a loved one experiencing a mental health crisis.

## Sign Proliferation

A vendor/contractor sign is allowed on a property during the course of the project. When the project is completed, the sign must be taken down. If not taken down in a timely fashion, the township will remove it and the property owner can be cited. Political Signs must have landowner permission for placement, no larger than 6 sf in size, must not be placed sooner than 30 days prior to the election and must be removed within 3 days after the election.



## Driveway Permits are REQUIRED for Resurfacing Your Driveway

These can be obtained on line at [www.pennsbury.pa.us](http://www.pennsbury.pa.us) or call the office at 610-388-1790. Permits are NOT needed for sealcoating your driveway—only for resurfacing. The Road Department can be very helpful in advising you on what to consider when planning for your driveway upgrade. You can call them at 610-388-9180. Too many driveways are done with minimal materials and fall apart quickly. THE HOMEOWNER IS RESPONSIBLE for obtaining the permit BEFORE the work is done.



## Township Recycling Bins are NOT for Garbage

The bins on the township property are NOT for garbage. There is a sign on each bin outlining what is ACCEPTABLE. Putting in the wrong items can disqualify the entire load. Remember to break down all boxes.



Unbroken down boxes can quickly fill up the space. If anyone sees someone illegally dumping in the bins, please notify the township office with a license and description of the vehicle. The state police will investigate and violator can be fined.

### HOLIDAY WASTE:

- **RECYCLING BIN:** Non-metallic wrapping paper and greeting cards without batteries
- **COMPOST:** Evergreens, tea bags, coffee grounds, leaves, twigs, fresh cranberries
- **GARBAGE CAN:** Cellophane, tissue paper, musical greeting cards, plastic ware

## It's Time for Those Winter Road Reminders

- 1 Do not park on the streets during snow and ice events.** If our drivers do not think they can salt, cinder or plow a street or cul-de-sac safely, they Will SKIP it or plow it after the road crew has finished the rest of the township. If vehicles are still on the street, the Township will have them towed at the owner's expense.
- 2 Do not put leaves in the street or gutter.** It is dangerous for cars and impedes water run-off.
- 3 Trim trees and shrubs along roads.** Make sure they do not impede visibility or make passage difficult.
- 4 Do not plant trees in the township right-of-way as well as placing rocks or boulders alongside the road.** These present a hazard to township vehicles plowing and can hinder road repairs. The right-of-way should always be kept clear of any object.
- 5 Secure your mailbox.** The Township is NOT responsible for damage to mailboxes. The mailbox and base should be strong enough to withstand flying snow and slush from traffic and snowplows. To prevent damage the front should be at least 12 inches from the edge of the road and the supporting post at least 3 feet from the edge of the road.
- 6 Keep the right-of-way clear.** Any installation of plants, mailboxes, etc. is done at the owner's risk.
- 7 Do not push snow into the street.** It is in violation of the Pennsylvania Vehicle Code to push snow into the street. It is also a danger to passing motorists.
- 8 Main subdivisions will be plowed first.** Less populated areas next.

### “Snow Emergency Route Signs” in Chadds Ford Knoll

These signs are installed at strategic points along the streets advising of “no parking” during weather events. Cars will be towed. Residents must park in their driveway.

## Short Summary of a Long-Term Plan

### *Pennsbury Comprehensive Plan Update*

**P**ennsbury will be kicking off the process to update their Comprehensive Plan this fall. The last plan was completed in 2006 and has successfully guided the Township's activities over the past 20 years. Now it's time to look forward to the next 20. Comprehensive Plans are long-range strategic documents that look holistically at a municipality, outlining a vision for the future and a framework for decision making. Key themes are identified and address such topics as land use, infrastructure, housing, transportation, economic development, historic and natural resource protection, and open space and recreation. This plan serves as a tool for municipalities to prioritize future improvements within the community.


The planning process will be led by the Brandywine Conservancy and be guided by a Task Force that will include members from the Township Planning Commission. Public participation and involvement will be key throughout this process to ensure the plan reflects the community's interests. Early in the process there will be a Community Values Survey as well as a Visioning Session to gather community input. Additional public meetings, and a dedicated Brandywine Conservancy webpage with background information and documents will be available throughout. It is anticipated that the plan will take 18 months to complete. •

ChesCO.org – ReadyChesCo is the official notification system for weather emergencies, missing persons alerts, prison incidents, evacuation, and shelter-in-place orders and more. Users can choose which types of information to receive and can also note any special needs information that may be useful for emergency responders.

- Receive messages by text, email or phone call, or any combination of the three.
- Get messages for more than one address (home, office, relatives' homes, schools).
- You can set up a quiet time so as not to receive messages during sleep hours.
