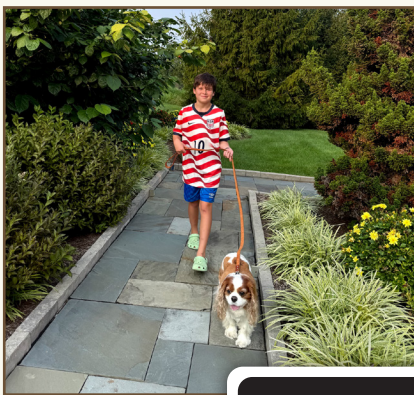

Planning Commission Update

The following is an update of the Planning Commission's (PC) primary meeting topics and activities since the last edition of the Pennsbury Township News.

- **357 Chandler Road (McMain).** The PC recommended that the Board of Supervisors (BoS) support this application for a variance from the 50-foot setback requirement to enable the homeowner to extend the width of the existing garage by 10 feet.
- **Sketch Plan Review and Reverse Subdivision Application (Sanford).** The PC met twice with the property owner's representative. The first meeting was to hold a sketch plan review, during which the PC heard from the property owner about the possibility of an application to reverse subdivide approximately 44 acres of land covered by Phase 2 of Windmill Hollow, a five-lot subdivision approved by the Township several years ago. If the owner rescinds the subdivision and recombines the tract into a single lot, the owner would plan to build a single residence for personal use, while preserving the rest of the land as open space.

Following the sketch plan review, the applicant submitted an application for a reverse subdivision of the Windmill Hollow Properties subdivision (Phase 2). The PC voted to recommend that the BoS approve the reverse subdivision subject to several conditions, including compliance with all outstanding comments and conditions identified by the Township Engineer.

- **1907 Hillendale Road & 901 Hickory Hill Road (Weathers and Herrera).** The applicants, who separately own adjacent properties at 1907 Hillendale Road and 901 Hickory Hill Road, propose to construct a shared driveway off of Hickory Hill Road that would serve both properties. The PC voted to recommend that the BoS support (1) the application for a special exception as to the riparian buffer on the 1907 Hillendale Drive property, and (2) the variance applications relating to the impact of the new driveway on environmental resources at 901 Hickory Hill Road, including riparian buffers and steep slopes, subject to consideration of several recommendations from the Township Engineer.

Branch Pick-Up

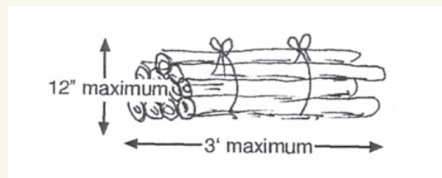
Monday–Friday, April 20–24

The road crew will come by only ONCE during the week so have your branches out on Monday. They will not be collected unless they are properly prepared. If you have questions call Road Master, Patrick Yerkes, at 610-388-9180.

This program is for residents to get rid of fallen limbs or small trees. IT IS NOT TO BE USED AS A COMMERCIAL TREE SERVICE OR FOR LOT CLEARING. The Township mulch pile is available for residents use. Contact Patrick Yerkes to coordinate pickup or with questions.

Preparation of brush and limbs:

- Brush and limbs must be from your Pennsbury Township property.
- Roots, stumps and limbs with wire and/or nails will NOT be picked up.
- All brush and limbs must be in the right of way.



- Dry, dead brush and tree limbs must be tied in bundles 3' long or less. Each bundle should be not greater than 12" in diameter.
- Fresh-cut (green) limbs, 2" in diameter and larger, should be left full length, placed along roadside with large ends closest to the road, not in a random pile.
- Only 8 bundles of brush and / or tree limbs and 10 fresh cut branches are allowed per property.

- **800 and 1000 Hickory Hill Road (Renninger).** The applicants appeared before the PC again in connection with their applications for a minor subdivision, variances, a special exception, and conditional use to build principal dwellings and accessory structures in the Route One Corridor and Brandywine Battlefield Overlay District. In this phase, the PC voted to recommend that the BoS approve the applicants' conditional use application for the four-lot Hickory Hill Road development, subject to several conditions involving landscaping to preserve the scenic viewshed and mitigation measures to protect the historic Isaac Mendenhall Springhouse on the property. The PC also voted to recommend that the BoS approve the applicants' subdivision plan, contingent on the applicants resolving all outstanding issues identified by the Township Engineer and obtaining written approval from the Brandywine Conservancy (part of the property is subject to a conservation easement held by the Conservancy).
- **519 Kennett Pike (McCauley).** In its second meeting this year from the property owners, the PC voted to recommend that the BoS support their application for a variance to allow them to re-use the existing freestanding sign from their current professional office, subject to several conditions.
- **Comprehensive Plan Update.** The team working on this project held four more meetings, on March 11, 2026, April 23, 2026, June 25, 2026, and July 23, 2026, and also hosted a Community Visioning Session with Township residents on March 19, 2026. Subjects addressed in the meetings, which will be included in the updated Comprehensive Plan, include: (1) Natural Resources, Open Space, and Recreation; (2) Land Use, Housing, and Community Services and Facilities; and (3) Historic and Scenic Resources.
- **2405 Brintons Bridge Road (Urbany).** The PC voted to recommend that the BoS support this application for a variance to the 50-foot setback requirement to allow the homeowner to construct a detached garage.

All Township residents are welcome to attend Planning Commission meetings, which are scheduled to be held on the second Wednesday of each month, beginning at 5:00 p.m. in the Township building. •

EMS Funding Crisis: Life-Saving Services Struggle Under Broken Reimbursement System

Across the United States, emergency medical services (EMS) agencies are facing a growing financial crisis that threatens the stability of a critical part of the healthcare and public safety system. While police departments typically receive stable municipal funding, EMS agencies often operate under a reimbursement model that fails to cover the true cost of providing care. As call volumes rise and workforce shortages intensify, many providers say the system is no longer sustainable.

EMS is frequently described as the first face or stage of the healthcare system. Paramedics and Emergency Medical Technicians (or EMT) respond to medical emergencies ranging from heart attacks and strokes to overdoses and traumatic injuries. In some communities, they may be the only healthcare professionals available 24 hours a day.

Yet, the way EMS is funded has remained largely unchanged for decades.

Most EMS agencies rely heavily on reimbursements from insurance providers, particularly **Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS)**. However, the federal reimbursement structure only pays EMS providers when a patient is transported to a hospital or certain medical facilities.

In fact, one researcher found that the average ambulance response loses more than \$1,000 per call, representing a 56% cost-to-reimbursement gap. Low-volume and public safety-based agencies fare even worse, with gaps exceeding 63% (Zavadsky, 2025).

This means that when EMS provides care but determines that a patient does not need to be taken to the hospital, the EMS agency often receives no reimbursement for the call. The practice, commonly referred to as “treat-no-transport,” has become increasingly common as EMS providers work to reduce unnecessary

emergency department visits and provide more patient-centered care. In these cases, paramedics may assess a patient, administer medications, treat injuries, or provide medical guidance that allows the individual to safely remain at home.

Despite providing medical care and utilizing personnel, equipment, medications, and vehicles, EMS agencies typically cannot bill insurers for these services. Some agencies then attempt payment through self-pay options (billing the patient) or simply write off the balances.

Industry leaders argue that the current model incentives transport rather than appropriate care. If EMS providers transport every patient regardless of need, they are more likely to receive reimbursement. If they treat patients on scene and prevent unnecessary hospital visits, they often absorb the cost themselves.

Beyond the treat-no-transport issue, EMS agencies face additional reimbursement challenges. Medicare payment rates frequently fall short of the actual cost of providing service, particularly in rural and suburban areas where ambulances may travel long distances to reach patients. Private insurance payments vary widely, and a significant portion of patients are uninsured or unable to pay.

These systemic gaps leave many EMS agencies dependent on local governments or volunteer organizations to fill the funding shortfall. In Pennsylvania, many EMS providers are private non-profit or volunteer-based services rather than municipal departments. As workforce

poools decline nationwide and operational costs increase, agencies are struggling to maintain staffing, replace aging ambulances, and keep stations open.

The financial pressures are already having visible consequences. Communities across the country have seen ambulance services close, merge, or reduce coverage areas due to funding shortages. Experts warn that without reform, response times could increase and some communities may face longer waits for lifesaving care.

In recent years, policymakers and healthcare leaders have begun discussing reforms that would allow EMS agencies to be reimbursed for care provided without transport. Pilot programs have explored alternative destinations such as urgent care centers, mental health facilities, or telemedicine consultations with physicians. Advocates say these changes could better align EMS reimbursement with modern healthcare practices while reducing strain on overcrowded emergency departments.

Historic Commission—Fairville Historic District

Fairville Historic District was officially listed on the National Register of Historical Places in November of 1996. It was originally known as Hogtown because farmer Aaron Harlan routinely allowed his hogs to roam freely. The town became known as Fairville after the Fairfield Post Office arrived in 1859 from nearby Burnt Mill Road. The district, consisting of 78 acres, was originally acquired by Owen Evans in 1744, but was sold in 1792 to Francis Boyce, a blacksmith. His shop remains on Kennett Pike today.

Metal working was an important industry from the late 1700's and throughout the 19th century. The forges produced goods for multiple water powered mills scattered across the countryside. The township cares for a small Mill off Fairville Road that remains in good shape. In the 1830's five blacksmith shops/forges including Boyce's Forge were producing goods for mills, farms and villagers in the area surrounding Fairville Village. As early as 1805 there was also a cobbler in town.

Fairville was a regional center of commerce throughout much of the 19th century. Due to the location at Fairville Road and Kennett Pike, it became a central location for farmers shipping goods to Wilmington, Kennett Square and Chadds Ford. The Sharpless family who bought much of the original tract of land owned by Owen Evans, operated a general store they built onto their home in 1828. The Post Office was also housed there.

After the construction of the Mendenhall train station in 1865, Fairville's role as a town center and farm market started to decline. The forges' roles also declined as steam power was becoming popular and replacing the need for water-powered mills. In 1870 the village consisted of about 100 inhabitants. The professions listed were a postmaster, 2 butchers, a carpenter, 3 millers (ie. 3 mills), 2 blacksmiths, an auger maker (and possibly his auger manufactory), 2 masons, a shoe and boot maker, a coal and lumber dealer, a physician, a railroad agent and a wagon maker. There were also 48 farmers listed in the village. By 1884, the village had shrunk to 60 inhabitants. The last working forge, the Boyce Forge, closed around 1919.

Still, meaningful reform has been slow.

Until reimbursement policies reflect the full scope of care EMS professionals provide, many agencies say the system will continue to place lifesaving services at financial risk.

For paramedics and EMTs on the front lines, the concern is simple: if EMS systems cannot afford to operate, communities may lose access to one of the most critical components of emergency care.

Due to the diligent work of our municipal stakeholders and the Kennett Fire and EMS Regional Commission, we are grateful to report that we have received the necessary municipal funds to maintain financial solvency. East Marlborough Township has continued to provide our organization and its providers with the resources to provide two 24/7 Mobile Intensive Care Units (with Paramedics) and one Ambulance (with EMTs) staffed during peak hours of the day.

Updating the Township's Comprehensive Plan

The Comprehensive Plan is a long-range policy guide for local growth, land use, and community development. It is authorized and governed by the Pennsylvania Municipalities Planning Code (MPC, Act 247 of 1968), which outlines specific content requirements and a mandatory 10-year review cycle. It serves as the foundation for enacting local zoning ordinances, subdivision regulations, and other legally enforceable documents.

Since the project began in January 2026, the Task Force, consisting of Township officials, committee members, residents, and planning consultants from the Brandywine Conservancy, has met six times to review data, surveys, and feedback from Township residents who attended the first Community Visioning session. Many of the Township's 2006 Comprehensive Plan's goals and objectives have been achieved, and significant progress has been made toward others. Township residents' long-held values of protecting open space and natural resources, as well as preserving our historical, cultural, and scenic resources, will continue to be part of the updated Plan, along with strategies to address concerns, particularly traffic and the pressures of development.

To date, the project Task Force has reviewed materials for specific content requirements and has begun drafting goals covering:

- Open Space, Recreation, and Natural Resources
- Guiding Growth
- Heritage Preservation
- Multi-modal Transportation

In September, the project Task Force will review our Resiliency Preparedness and other items, with the objective of having a draft plan ready for review starting in December. The final review is expected to be completed in February 2027, with adoption of the Plan by mid-year 2027, following completion of the formal submission process.
